

Hope for the Homeless

And now a word from one of our residents at the Cecil County Men's Shelter (Settlement House):

I can't be more honored and proud to be selected to write about "Settlement House" program for Veterans as well as civilians.



I'd first like to address the stereotype about the homeless; though there are some few that choose that lifestyle, most homeless are normal, honest, hardworking and deserving people who wound up in that situation due to circumstances not of their own doing. There are some who have struggled with drugs, alcohol, legal, mental health, physical health and/or broken family issues. Those experiencing homelessness are typically looked upon as lazy, dirty, creepy, untrustworthy people, and this for the most part could not be farther from the truth.

Let me introduce myself; my name is John T., and I have worked my whole life from the age of twelve including a near eight year tour in the US Navy aboard two different nuclear powered, nuclear missile carrying "submarines."

I can't say where I would be right now if VA hadn't brought me here to Settlement House. This program is designed first to provide immediate temporary housing to be followed by help to achieve permanent housing. The program is set up to guide Settlement House residents to overcome all possible issues that are causing homelessness. Up to 15 people, mostly Veterans of all of our US Armed Forces, are supplied a temporary home with a large kitchen full of food. We have an awesome house, warm beds and every imaginable resource to hand, with a staff that oversees the daily progress of our journey to wellness and a once again normal life into a safe and healthy environment, back into the community.

As residents here we all realize that our own best resource is ourselves; sharing information, life stories, personal property and all around concern for our fellow residents. Funding is limited, and most things are donated, but the staff here somehow make it work and gives "Hope for the Homeless."
